From Pastor Jim

How quickly we all witnessed the transition from Christmas to Valentine's Day! Stores seemingly made the transition overnight. Not a hint of Christmas is left – except those rare occurrences of a 'closeout sale' or a 'clearance aisle' to expedite the liquidation of surplus Christmas merchandise.

What about you, Christian? Have you left Christmas 'in the dust' while making your way through the first weeks of 2025? Most, if not all, of the Christmas trees and decorations have been packed away and Christmas cards thrown away.

How surprised, joyfully surprised I am as I drive through parts of Marinette where there are still a few lights and other symbols of Christmas left on trees and in the yards of some homes. While it has probably been too cold to take them down, what peace and warmth and joyful reflection it has brought me on a dark drive home from church to continue remembering and celebrating the birth of Jesus, the 'newborn King.'

How pleasant, indeed, it is to meditate on the peace and presence of Jesus in our daily life! Christmas is not 'over' for Christians. It transitioned into the season of Epiphany that reveals to us through the Holy Scriptures of 'Who' this Jesus is. We have learned that Jesus IS the living 'Word of God' – Who comes to us in the Holy Sacraments of Baptism, the Lord's Supper, and the spoken Word.

In the Lord's Supper, we are clearly reminded of Jesus' presence with us through His true body and blood in, with, and under for forms of bread and wine. Christmas is all about celebrating 'Immanuel' – God's presence with us each day – Jesus' presence with us each day. Epiphany reminds us through the life of Jesus how He fulfills the will of God for Him as our Teacher and Savior. Even without the trees, decorations, presents, and parties, Christians must celebrate, show, and share the presence of Jesus in our daily lives so that others might see.

The coming celebration of "Valentine's Day" and its emphasis on 'love' is something that can be celebrated by Christians. What greater quality of the Triune God – Father, Son, and Holy Spirit - towards the crown of creation (you and me) than to focus on the 'unconditional love' that we all receive from our merciful heavenly Father. ***"For God so loved the world that He gave His one and only Son – that whoever believes in Him shall not perish, but have everlasting life."* (John 3:16)**



While it is often used in the context of wedding services, the words recorded in 1 Corinthians 13 are for how we are to 'live' Christian love towards others. Reflect on the following words in the light of your relationship with your spouse, children, siblings, neighbors, and others.

"Love is patient and kind; love does not envy or boast; it is not arrogant or rude. It does not insist on its own way; it is not irritable or resentful; it does not rejoice at wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. Love bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never ends." (1 Corinthians 13:4-8a)

February witnesses the end of the season of Epiphany and the quick transition to the Lenten season beginning with 'Ash Wednesday' on March 5th. What another great opportunity and season for Christians to focus on the love of God for us sinners that motivated Him to send His one and only Son Jesus as the propitiation for our sins and sustained Him through the last agonizing days of His earthly life.

Your attitude should be the same as that of Christ Jesus: Who, being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made Himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in appearance as a man, He humbled Himself and became obedient to death - even death on a cross! Therefore, God exalted Him to the highest place and gave Him the name that is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father" (Philippians 2:5-11)

What will YOUR attitude be during this upcoming season of Lent? Will you make time to gather in the Lord's house for worship on the Wednesday's during Lent that focus on the journey to the cross of our Lord and Savior Jesus Christ and give thanks for the sacrifice He made which saved you from eternal damnation?

Husbands, fathers, heads of households, it is your calling and privilege to lead your families in remembering the passion and suffering of Jesus for a world of lost sinners.



What will be YOUR attitude as we approach the season of Lent? Pray that your attitude is like that of Christ Jesus – humble, servant-oriented, other-focused, loving, forgiving, and obedient to the will of His Father. Won't you humble yourself and come to share in praising and giving thanks to God for His gift of love in Jesus for you - for me - for all?

SERVING THE LORD IN RIGIA, LATVIA

Greetings in the Name of Jesus,

I was reading Deuteronomy 31 in my daily devotions the other day, and I was struck by this line of Scripture: "And the Lord said to Moses, "Behold, the days approach when you must die" (Deuteronomy 31:14). I know this statement unfolds within God's commissioning of Joshua, the people of Israel's transition into the Promised Land, and after Moses disobedience. Nevertheless, it's just so matter of fact. I was amazed at how Moses didn't complain, argue, beg, or plead. He knows he can trust in God even in the face of death. He knows he can trust God's will even when that means suffering the inevitable consequences of sin as declared by God back in the Garden of Eden.

LORD your God goes with you

Earlier in the chapter, God encourages Joshua by saying, "Be strong and courageous, for you shall go with this people into the land that the Lord has sworn to their fathers to give them, and you shall put them in possession of it. It is the Lord who goes before you. He will be with you; he will not leave you or forsake you. Do not fear or be dismayed" (Deuteronomy 31:7-8). Like Moses and Joshua, God's people can be courageous because God's plans are the only plans that last for eternity, and those plans are ultimately plans of forgiveness, salvation, and restoration. These plans are fully revealed in Jesus, where we see God's will for His people on full display through the death and resurrection of His Son.

I often say that the most difficult petition of the Lord's Prayer to pray is the Third Petition because in it we ask that God's will, not our will, be done. This means truly trusting in God even as we see our own plans diminishing, breaking, or dying. It means trusting God the way Moses does even when facing death. Like Moses, we know the mighty works of God, how He has brought life and light out of death and darkness through His Son. But we, unlike Moses, get to experience that here and now through our Baptisms and through the preaching of God's Word and the Lord's Supper.

On the mission field, it can be easy to forget that the only plans that persist through sin and death are those of our Savior's. As people from all different races, nationalities, and tribes busy themselves with their plans, they need to hear of the One who calls them to trust in Him. They need to know that only Jesus can transform their life of sin and death into His mercy, goodness, and everlasting righteousness.

BOARD OF MISSIONAL LIFE

Ministering By Seeking the Kingdom

"Seek first the Kingdom of God." - Jesus in Matthew 6:33

(Please read these excerpts from Joining Jesus on His Mission: How to Be an Everyday Missionary, by Greg Finke)

Jesus has brought the Kingdom of God into our world and into our community. Therefore, ... "seeking the kingdom" is the first practical step we can take in joining Jesus in what he is doing. The more we seek the more Jesus can show us; and the more we seek the more Jesus can do with us. So, what is Jesus already showing us? What is he already inviting us to notice and do?

Are you sometimes irritated by the people who interrupt your day? I know I can be. Maybe now is a good time to stop seeing such moments as interruptions and start seeing them as appointments ... appointments set up by God without consulting with us. "In his heart, a man plans his course, but the LORD determines his steps," Proverbs 16:9.

Wherever you go there you are and wherever you are Jesus is already up to something. Therefore, coincidences become God incidences. Good luck becomes God's anonymous provision. Bad luck becomes God's redirection of our plans. The human needs we see in our neighbors, co-workers and friends no longer can be set aside (like the priest and Levite do in the story of the good Samaritan) but now are personal invitations from Jesus for us to respond (like the Samaritan who stepped in and not around when he saw the man on the road).

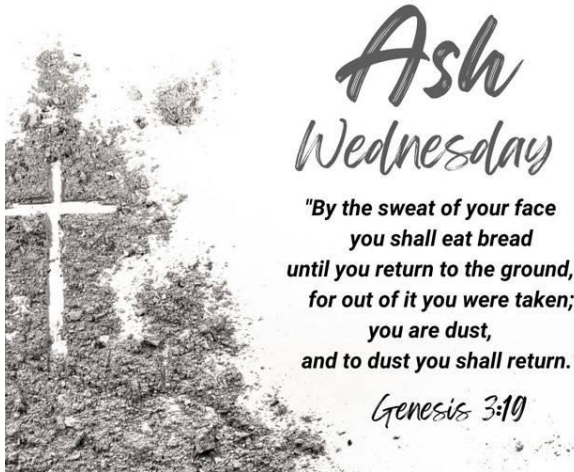
The practice of seeking the kingdom is simply forming the habit of watching for what God is showing us every day in the midst of our daily routines.

Lent 2025 at Faith Lutheran Church

The season of Lent begins on Wednesday, March 5, with a 'fellowship meal' at 5:30pm followed by a Lenten 'hymn-sing' at 6:20pm and our "Ash Wednesday" worship service at 6:30pm. This is the only Lenten 'midweek' worship service that will include the "Imposition of Ashes" and "The Lord's Supper."



What is the history of the "Imposition of Ashes"? During the "Middle Ages" – which spanned from the late 5th century to the early 15th century (AD) – ashes were sprinkled on the heads of those who gathered in churches on "Ash Wednesday" and joined in the confession of their sins.

Today, the pastor applies ashes to the foreheads of the worshipers in the shape of a cross while speaking the words first spoken to Adam after his fall into sin, "For you are dust, and to dust you shall return." (Genesis 3:19c)

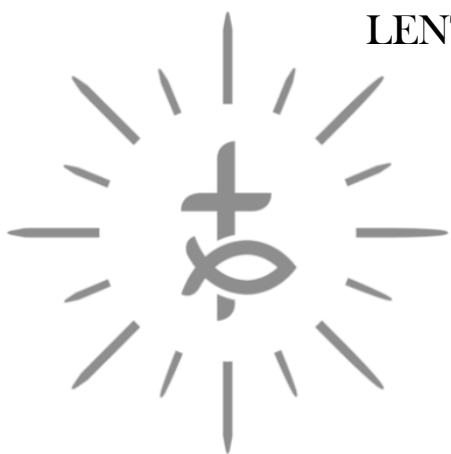
The season of Lent is a calling from our heavenly Father to 'return' to Him. Joel 2:12, "'Yet even now,' declares the LORD 'return to Me with all your heart, with fasting, with weeping, and with mourning; and rend your hearts and not your garments.' Return to LORD your God, for He is gracious and merciful, slow to anger, and abounding in steadfast love; and He relents over disaster."

Purple is the traditional color for Lent as it is a color that symbolizes 'penitence' which is a response of sorrow and regret for our sins against the will of God. Since 'purple' was the most expensive of dyes used in the time of Jesus, it was worn by the wealthy and those of high status and rank. As the "King of the Jews," Jesus wore a purple robe on "Good Friday." As the soldiers mocked Him, the Biblical record tells us that they placed a "purple robe" on Him in order to ridicule Him and belittle the claim that He was a king. (Matthew 27:28; Mark 15:17; Luke 23:11; John 19:2)

THE SEASON OF LENT IS ANOTHER OPPORTUNITY ...

TO INVITE AND BRING WITH US TO WORSHIP friends, family, neighbors, 'in-active' Christians, or members of the flock who have lapsed from participating with us in the blessings of Christian fellowship and worship around Word and the holy sacraments.

Please pray to the Holy Spirit for the words that will stir the hearts and minds of those we **approach, invite, and bring** with us to celebrate and worship the majesty of our Savior Jesus during the season of Lent – especially His willingness to bear our sins on the cross for the forgiveness of our sins that leads to eternal life in heaven.



LENTEN MIDWEEK & HOLY WEEK THEME

RESTORED IN CHRIST®

The season of Lent is a time for us to face together the brokenness of our lives and our world and then turn that brokenness over to Christ so that we can be restored by Him through the cross.

Following are descriptions of the Lenten 'midweek' services. The April newsletter will provide descriptions of the themes for the celebration of "Holy Week."

Lent 2025 Worship Schedule

Wednesday, March 5 – ASH WEDNESDAY – Joel 2:12-14

"Broken Hearts Restored" – Our hearts are broken in sorrow over sin; Christ restores our hearts through His forgiveness.

Wednesday, March 12 – Lent Midweek One – Mark 14:1-9

"Broken Vessel Restored" – A broken vessel holds costly perfume; we are broken vessels restored when Christ pays the price for us on the cross.

Wednesday, March 19 – Lent Midweek Two – Matthew 26:14-25

"Broken Trust Restored" – Judas breaks his trust with Jesus by betraying Him; our broken trust is restored through the sacrifice of Christ.

Wednesday, March 26 – Lent Midweek Three – John 6:48-58

"Broken Bread Restored" – Bread is broken at the Last Supper; we are restored through the Bread of Life, Jesus.

Wednesday, April 2 – Lent Midweek Four – Matthew 26:69-75

"Broken Promises Restored" – Peter's broken promises to never deny Jesus are restored by the surpassing love of Christ.

Wednesday, April 9 – Lent Midweek Five – 2 Corinthians 5:20-21

"Broken Justice Restored" – A broken justice system put Jesus on the cross; we are restored when by His death we are declared "Not guilty!"

Repenting of “Feasts that Know No Fast”

Fresh off the Christmas season and the retail frenzy that accompanies it, January brings a shot of frigid air into the lives of the people we know and love. This is not a meteorological statement either. While it is true that January is one of the colder months for those in North America, the cold front blast that hits us is the full force of credit card spending that fueled the retail frenzy. The bills for the gifts, the parties, the food and the travel have now come due. The credit card makes things convenient, but it also requires more discipline than many can muster. When the bills come in January for December's celebration, it really puts a damper on things.

Congregations often make the same mistake in stewardship. We often charge forward in doing what we always do or starting new endeavors without counting the cost. But at the end of the month, or the end of year, when the bill comes due, the red ink on the congregational balance sheet smacks the people in the face like a stiff north wind in January. We hunkered down. We circle the wagons. We start to panic. The work of the Gospel suffers.

The fifth verse of “Forgive Us, Lord, for Shallow Thankfulness” (LSB 788) addresses this January situation. The words penned by William Watkins Reid are very needful for us to hear as we start a new year, while dealing with the bills of past efforts and expense.

“Forgive us, Lord for feast that knows not fast ...” This hits us hard, doesn't it? We love when the money is flowing, the parties are going, and things are getting bigger and better. But there is a time in life, and most especially in our spiritual disciplines, that we need to fast. The purpose of a fast is to step back, lay something aside for a time, and replace it with meditation on Scripture and prayer. This is designed to keep us from turning something that may well be good into an idol that separates us from the God who loves us in Christ.

“For joy in things that meanwhile starve the soul ...” In “The Parable of the Sower,” we hear Jesus talk about how the worries and cares of life choke out the growth of the seed of the Word that was planted. We know how this happens in our lives. Professional and youth sports do this. Materialism does this. Travel and leisure do this. There is a list of things that we enjoy that starve the soul.

But it also happens in our congregations. When corporate stewardship is not managed in a responsible way, it can and does destroy individual stewardship. Is it good individual stewardship to support a ministry that doesn't take its corporate responsibility seriously?

“For walls and wars that hide your mercies vast and blur our vision of the Kingdom goal.” This is the ultimate end of the idolatry of failed stewardship. We build walls between believers within the church and hamper those who are outside from coming to the Light of Life that is Jesus. The wars we fight over money and its impact on ministry do the same. It eventually blurs our vision of what we are here to do: share the Good News of Jesus. When the wintry blast of January hits us in this fashion, we are called to repent.

When the Holy Spirit uses the cold front of the call to repentance, we meet the God who forgives and restores. That is what He does for individual and corporate stewards. When the bills hit, they call us back to Jesus. He is the One who indeed forgives us our shallow thankfulness and leads us into the bounty of His mercy yet again.



SUNDAY SCHOOL

The 1st through 3rd grade Sunday school worked on building a tower from dominoes. Each one took turns placing a domino to build the tower. We read, "Joseph goes to jail". Genesis 39. They were asked "What is more stressful - watching others add to the tower or adding it yourself?" They all agreed watching other add to it was more stressful.

God is good no matter what. Even when things are nerve wracking or feel impossible. God always loves us and wants what is best for us. Is the lesson from this activity.

We held a blanket day at our church on 12/4, Faith in Crivitz is this week 1/24, and the one in February will be at St. Mary's in Crivitz. We will rotate the make-a-blanket days between these three churches. FINAL 2024 AWARD PRESENTATION:

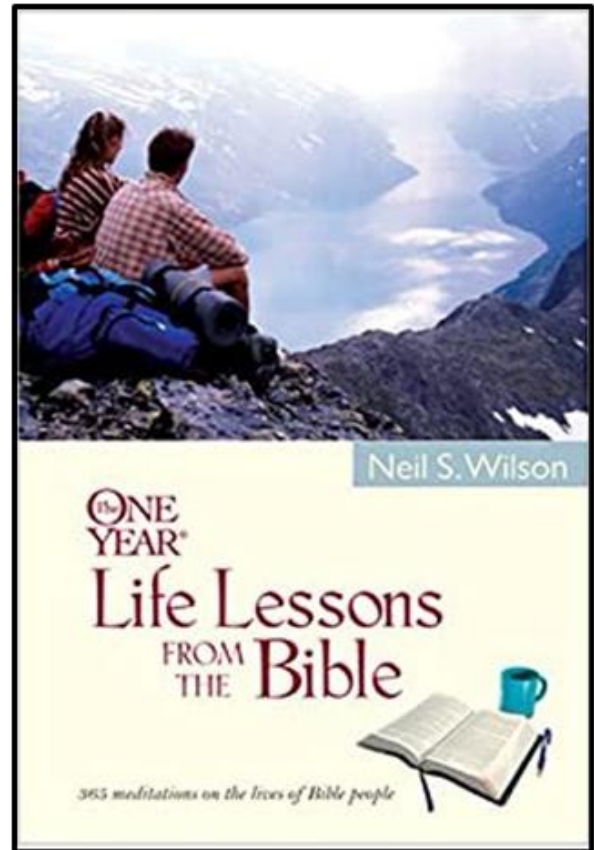
After the service on Sunday, 1/19/25, Christopher Moon presented a check for \$3,763 to Captain Jason McGhee from the MENOMINEE POLICE DEPARTMENT to purchase Emergency Medical Trauma Kits for all the officers in the department. This will allow the officers to administer first-aid, if needed, while waiting for emergency EMS personnel to arrive at an accident or crime scene. This completes Team Goal # 2.

All of the funds raised by the 2024 Revitalization Team have now been awarded. The five team projects undertaken in 2024 raised a total of \$14,277. Anonymous donors also contributed a total of \$4,900 for three proposed projects which were not selected by the congregation. These donations went to the PESHTIGO FIRE DEPARTMENT to purchase an AED for their EMS unit, to the MARINETTE FIRE DEPARTMENT to purchase a replacement Mustang (water rescue) Suit, and a gift of cash to the FOSTER CLOSET in Menominee, Michigan.

Your life will never be the same.

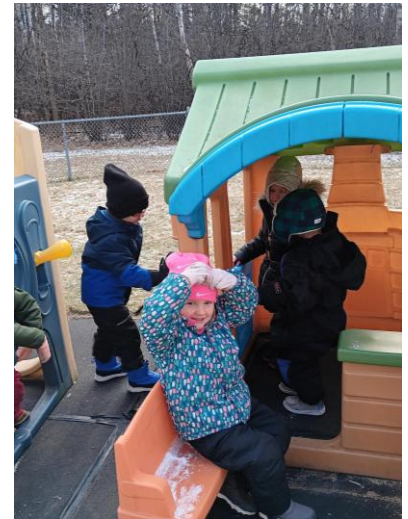
Preschool
