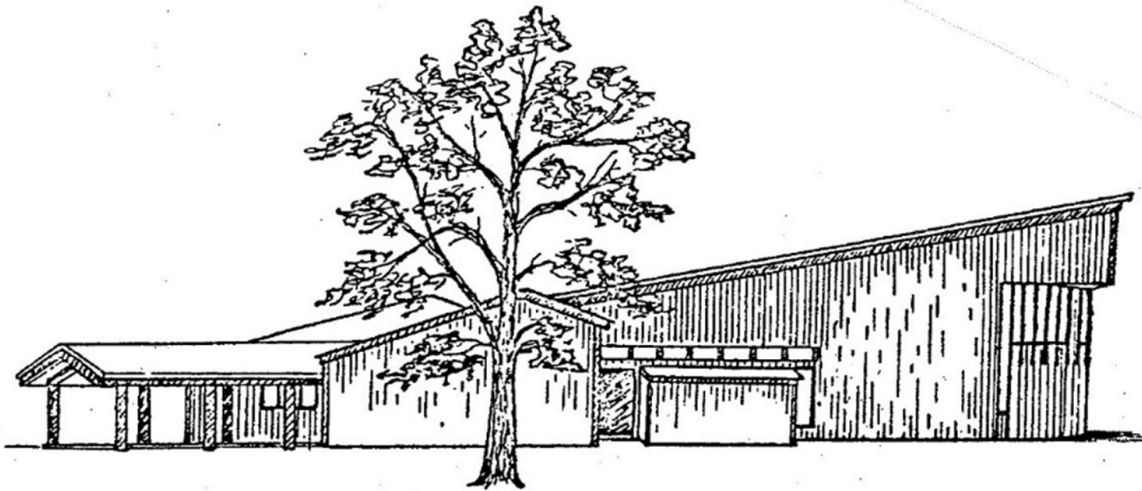

A Message from Pastor Jim

“But when the fullness of time had come, God sent forth His Son ...”

These words written by St. Paul in Galatians 4:4 describe the exact moment in time when God’s promises and prophecies in the Old Testament were fulfilled – the birth of Jesus. Do you remember the first promise and the prophecies?

First Promise ... *Genesis 3:15, “I will put enmity between you and the woman, and between your offspring and her offspring; He shall bruise your head and you shall bruise His heel.”* Jesus is the ‘offspring’ that crushed the head of Satan through the cross and won victory for us over the power of sin.

Prophecy ... to King Ahaz the prophet Isaiah revealed a ‘sign’ from God in Isaiah 7:14, *“Therefore, the Lord himself will give you a sign. Behold, the virgin shall conceive and bear a son, and shall call His name Immanuel.”* The virgin Mary was the mother of Jesus. “Immanuel” means “God with us” – a promise that bring just as much comfort today as it did to King Ahaz.

Prophecy ... *Micah 5:2, “But you, O Bethlehem Ephrathah, who are too little to be among the clans of Judah, from you shall come forth for me one Who is to be ruler in Israel, whose coming forth is from of old, from ancient days.”* The journey of Joseph and Mary ended in Bethlehem where *“she gave birth to her firstborn son” (Luke 2:7)*. To the shepherds in the countryside the angel of the Lord said, *“For unto you is born this day in the city of David a Savior, who is Christ the Lord” (Luke 2:11).*

The words from Galatians 4 at the top were just the beginning. Listen to the rest of the account that describes ‘why’ God came to us in the person of Jesus – *“... born under the Law **to redeem** those who were under the Law, so **that we might receive** adoption as sons.”*

Through Jesus God the Father ‘redeemed’ us ... ‘purchased’ us with the holy, precious blood of Jesus and with His innocent suffering and death that we might be His own and live under Him in His kingdom. *“In the fullness of time”* we were bought by God so that through faith in Jesus we would become *“children of God” (John 1:12).*

Praises to God as we worship, celebrate, and share the name of Jesus through whom God intervened in human history ... through whom God offers forgiveness to all sinners ... and through whom God will receive all the faithful to their eternal reward in heaven.

THE SEASON OF ADVENT & MIDWEEK THEMES

The “Time of Christmas” begins with the season of Advent which is also the first season of each new church year.

The color for Advent is blue, which symbolizes anticipation and hope in our coming King. Violet can also be used during Advent as a symbol of our repentance in preparation for the coming King.

The “Gloria in Excelsis” is not sung in the divine services during the season of Advent. This is the angels’ song to the shepherds on the night of Jesus’ birth, and we pass over this Christmas “Hymn of Praise” in silent anticipation.

It has become common to use an Advent wreath to mark the passage of the season. This wreath has four candles – one for each Sunday in Advent. As the candles are lit in growing number of the four weeks, our anticipation mounts as we look forward to Jesus’ coming.

JOIN US ON THE FOLLOWING WEDNESDAYS IN DECEMBER AT 6:30PM:

December 3 – Midweek One “*The Gift of HOPE*” (Romans 5:3-4)

The account of Jesus during Advent is the account of the promised hope that come into the world. [Galatians 4:4-5](#) states, "But when the set time had fully come, God sent His Son... to redeem those under the law, that we might receive adoption to sonship". The season of Advent teaches us to prepare to receive Jesus, the HOPE of the world.

December 10 – Midweek Two “*The Gift of LOVE*” (1 John 4:10)

The ‘love’ of God for sinners is known and taught in the passage called “the gospel in a nutshell” – John 3:16, “For God so loved the world, that He gave His only Son, that whoever believes in Him should not perish but have eternal life.”

December 17 – Midweek Three “*The Gift of PEACE*” (John 14:27)

One of the earliest Bible passages that teaches about Jesus is the description of Him we all know from Isaiah 9:6, “For to us a child is born, to us a son is given; and the government shall be upon His shoulder, and His name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Mighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace.”

LUTHERAN WORLD RELIEF CELEBRATES 80 YEARS OF CARING AND SHARING

LWR was founded in the aftermath of WWII. By the end of 1944, Europe was enveloped by a tremendous displacement crisis as the war marched on. In response to this desperate situation, members fasted during the Lenten season and collected the funds they saved in an offering to meet the needs of displaced Europeans including: food, clothing and quilts. By the end of the 1940's, LWR was also sending relief aid to those affected by conflicts in Palestine, Hong Kong, Korea, and Bangladesh.

In the 1950's, LWR was called again to respond to the suffering of war, establishing 140 feeding centers and distributed 31,000 meals a day across Korea in the aftermath of the Korean War.

In the 1960's, LWR convened evangelical churches across the U.S. to send food and clothing to Vietnam during that war. The work broadened extensively with President John F. Kennedy's "Food for Peace" committee to get food to some of the world's poorest communities.

In the 1970's (after the Vietnam War), LWR continued moving in its mission, working with the U.S. government to build the national resettlement program which welcomed refugees fleeing conflict in places like Vietnam, Cambodia, and Laos. LWR began relationships with farming cooperatives to increase rural incomes and food security in the developing world. In 1979, LWR opened its first regional office in Peru.

During the 1980's-1990's, LWR responded to the African famine by shipping over 5,000 tons of wheat to northern Ethiopia and opened a regional office in West Africa. LWR became the first faith-based organization to receive the Presidential End Hunger award.

Since the year 2000, LWR has increased its emphasis in the area of agriculture and responded to major natural disasters and humanitarian crises around the world. As of 2023, LWR maintains ongoing operations in 29 countries in Central/South America, Arica, the Middle East, Asia, and Oceania.

2025 REVITALIZATION TEAM: DECEMBER UPDATE

As of November 12, 2025, all of the Faith Lutheran Church Revitalization Team Goals that were adopted by the congregation earlier this year have been completed. Here is a list of the donations received from members of the the community and the congregation this year.

1. \$4,040 for the Rawhide Youth Home in Marinette, WI to refurbish / replace cabinets, countertops and add an island to the kitchen - (Liaison: Sharon Starks)
2. \$2,000 for The Marinette County Sheriff's Office to support two (2) Global Human Oppression Strike Teams (G.H.O.S.T.) to proactively combat Internet Crimes Against Children (ICAC) and Human Trafficking (HT) - (Liaisons: Jim & Lois Zill).
3. \$2,300 for Camp Daniel in Athelstane, WI to purchase a commercial grade clothes washer and dryer - (Liaison: Pastor Krueger).
An additional \$1,300 for Camp Daniel was also given by an anonymous donor from the congregation to purchase software for their digital sign system and a silk screen printer used to make items sold in their Gift Shop.
4. \$1,000 for Rainbow House Domestic Abuse Services, Inc. in Marinette and Oconto to purchase 5 sets of Cleaning & Household Product Kits - (Liaison: Kelly Coan).

On Sunday, October 26th , a check for \$3,600 was presented to Tony and Jo Piantine, from Camp Daniel, after the worship service.

In early November we received a donation of \$1,350 from an anonymous doner in the congregation for the Marinette County Sheriffs Office "G.H.O.S.T. Strike Team" project. We will be scheduling a check presentation with a representative from The Marinette County Sheriff's Office in the near future.

We've branched out a bit and now offer rides to appointments and help with small jobs, but still our primary task is making meals to those who would appreciate the help.

So, please keep us in mind and if you know of a member needing this type of service, please let us know. We'd be sad to find out we missed someone who needed our help and we weren't aware of it. You can let Pastor know of the need, call the church office and let Maggie or Kayla know of the need, or tell me, Kelly Coan.

And, if you'd like to join our small group, please let me know that too! We'd love to increase our size. No one is ever pressured to make a meal or to drive someone to an appointment, it is all on a "volunteer if you can basis" at the time of need. An email is sent out informing our group of the need and members reply if they can help. Sometimes its just a simple sharing of your meal with one of our members that is required, not a full meal for an entire family. Too, if you do the cooking I can have the meal delivered for you. We're a very flexible group.

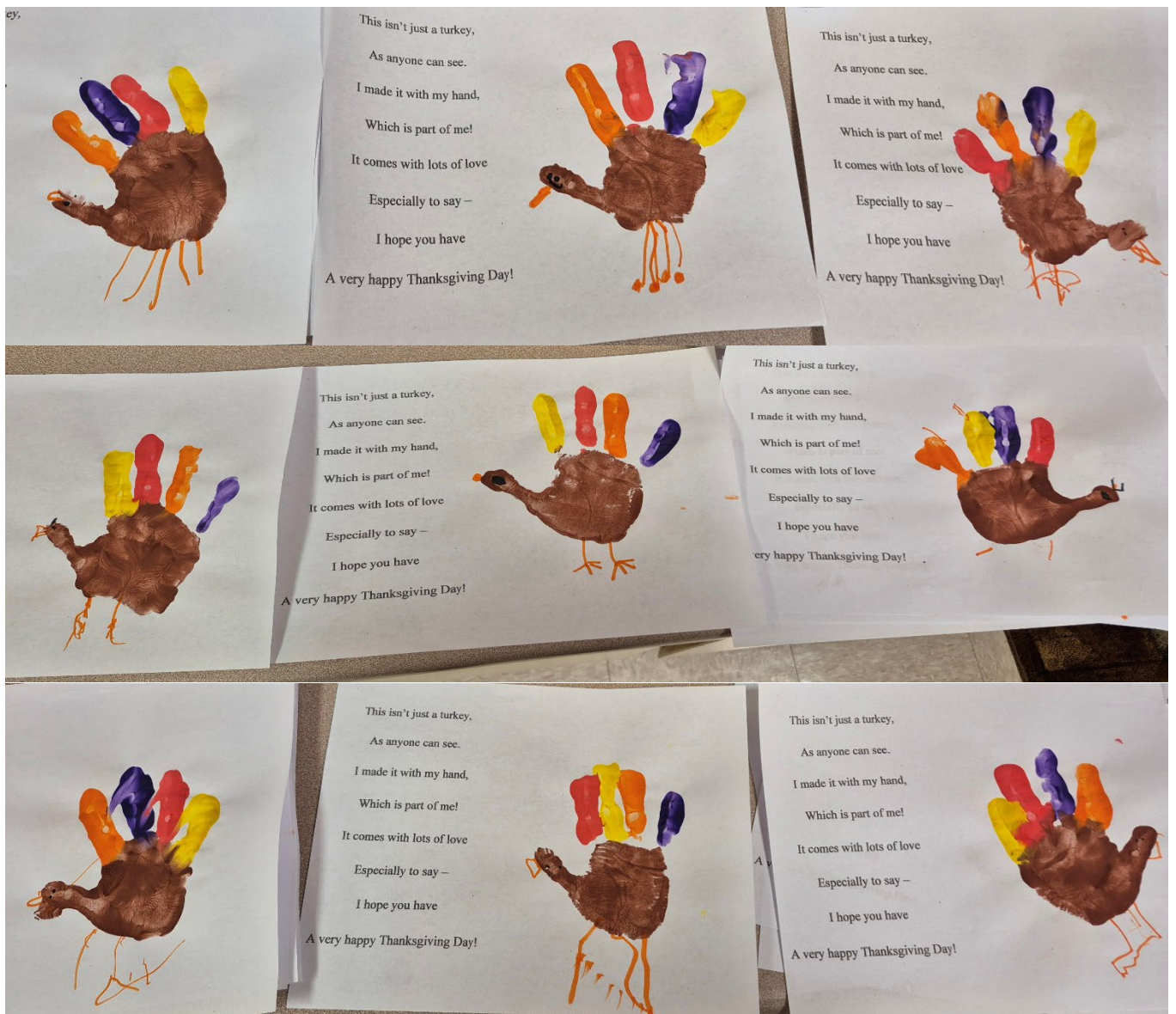

A letter From our Concordia 'Adopted' Family The Genzlers

Genzlers

Dear Brothers and Sisters,

Thanksgiving Greetings!

The weather has finally begun to cool down, which means this Wisconsin family is feeling more comfortable going outside and exploring God's wonderful Creation. What a blessing of Our Lord!



Barbara has had a few teeth pop through, so she is well on her way to eating regular food. Kathryn has begun learning how to write; in fact, she wrote a letter to her grandparents and mailed it! Both children continue to grow and learn (and even teach their parents about God's patience He has with us, His children)!

Classes continue! We have a major project with Reformation class where we create a large research paper based on an aspect Luther describes in his

writings. With my background as a Lutheran high school teacher, I thought it would be interesting to engage the Reformer's thoughts on education. Though the educational system was quite different from our current one in the United States, there are surprising connections.

Old Testament is engaged with the prophets at the moment, and we'll be diving into a deep study of Isaiah's Vineyard Song (5:1-7). Hebrew was an important prerequisite, and it is wonderful to engage the text as it was written all those years ago.

Pauline Epistles class is tackling Galatians and Ephesians as we look into the intricacies of the Greek language and the problems it can present for native English speakers. While the doctrine remains intact, our understanding takes some time with English's shortcomings.

Systematics went through a lengthy unit about Creation and grounding the Christian's understanding of our faith in the concept that God reveals Himself firstly as Creator. This has interesting ramifications as you pull on the thread, but what a wonderful God we have who has created us and continues to create for and to sustain us!

Worship and the Word has been focused on shaping us as pastors in the parish, particularly with the background of why we do specific things on Sunday. We have had to create a basic Sermon Series, we have to write a sermon for an occasion (church or civic), and we will eventually create an Annotated Divine Service, complete with readings, hymns, and all other pieces. We have explored early church practices to see what small things we can bring into our personal practice in worship as pastors, which has been enlightening.

A letter From our Concordia Adopted Family The Genzlers (con't)

As we get into the colder weather, we will be visiting with my parents for Thanksgiving, including cutting down a Christmas tree and getting their place gussied up for the Christmas season. For the Advent season, I've been asked by my Residential Field Experience (RFE) church to give a Wednesday evening sermon and an Advent IV Sunday sermon. I will also be providing music with my guitar and voice throughout Advent and at our Christmas Eve service. We will be headed back to my parents' house the day after Christmas.



This is a part of a pastor's life that has a learning curve: holidays are not always about spending time with extended family on the holiday itself. This became apparent to me early in life when my grandfather would arrive back on Christmas morning having given a service and collapsing on the living room floor for a post-church nap. One year, my grandmother had given us a new camping tent, and we set it up in the living room as he napped. When he awoke, voila! A 3-person, L.L. Bean tent had grown in his house. What a miracle!

In January, I will have an intense two-week course on Pastoral Leadership, exploring the intricacies of a pastor's role in the church. Is he an administrator, a member of a larger team, or some variation? We will learn in this class.

The Spring will bring a new batch of classes that I will describe in my next letter, but Call Day is scheduled for April 28. We have a countdown in our kitchen for this; 170 days (roughly) from today! We are very excited to see where God will send me (and us) to serve His people (temporarily though it will be).



As we gather closer together in the upcoming holiday season, we are constantly reminded of the generosity of all the saints, yourselves most assuredly included. We would be in dire straits if you were not here to support us as we answer God's call. Though I have no doubt the Lord would have seen us through somehow, I am certain that you are no less than His hands in the present time, raising up this man to become a pastor.

From our home and our hearts, thank you!

God's Blessings to you this day, this season, and in every season as we stretch toward the goal which He has in store for you and us.

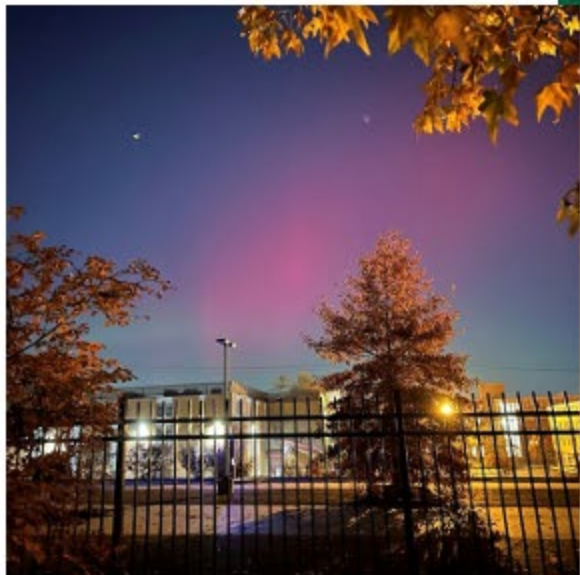

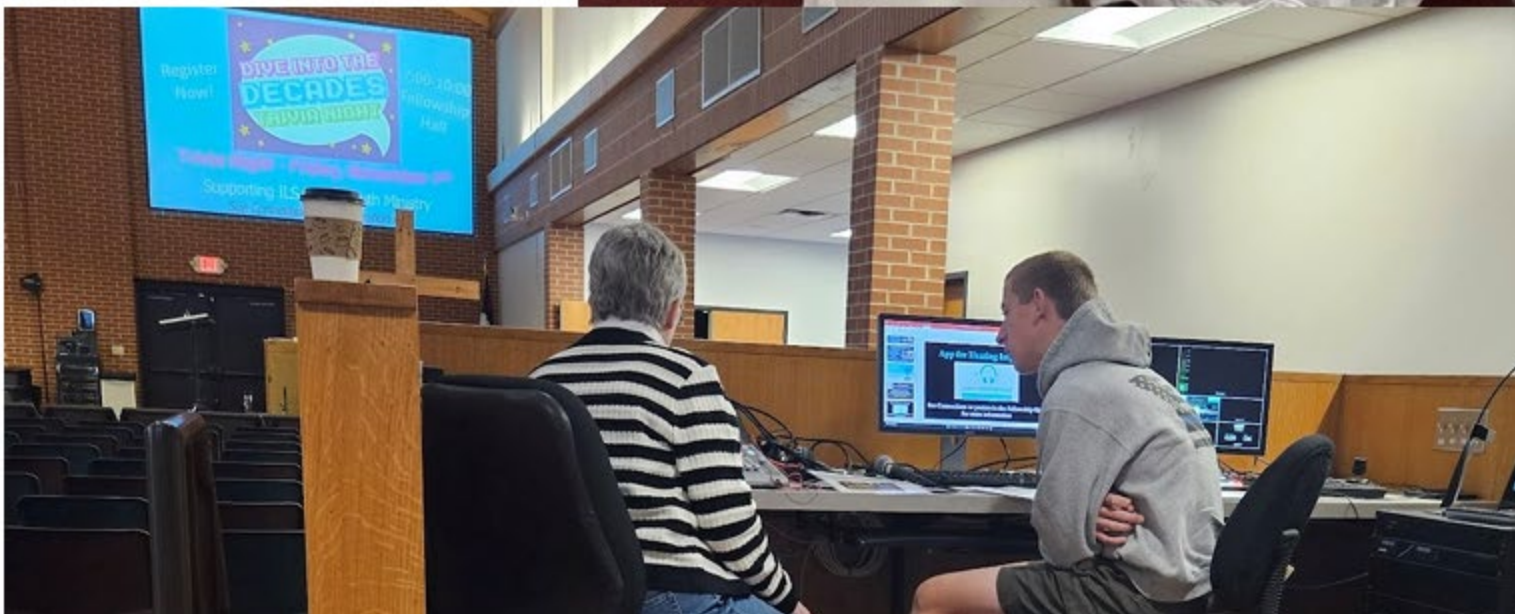
